CENTENARIAN'S FAMILY LINK WITH FROYLE

The last of the Burningshams of Froyle celebrated her 100th birthday on Monday. Born on October 18th, 1882, and christened Mary Ada, she was the only daughter of Major and Mrs. H. G. C. Burningham, of Froyle House.

The family had owned and lived in many of the houses in Froyle since the time when Peter de Burningham, younger son of Baron Athenvy, came over from Ireland in the 16th century and settled in the village.

Mary Burningham married Henry Edmonds in 1922 and settled for some years in South Africa where her husband owned a sugar plantation.

Later they came back to England and lived for many years in Basingstoke.

Following her husband's death, Mrs. Edmonds moved away from Hampshire and has for several years been living happily at the Villa Maria Nursing Home at Ewell, Surrey, where she was the centre of attention at a party given by the nursing home in her honour last Monday.

Amongst others who visited her was the Mayor of Epsom and Ewell, Councillor William Carpenter, accompanied by the Mayoress, who presented Mrs. Edmonds with a magnificent bouquet of flowers.

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BURNINGHAM RECORDS

These records trace the history of the Farnham family of BURNINGHAM over the last four hundred years since they came over from Ireland to Proyle in Hampshire where they settled first and later when they moved to Farnham in Surrey.

These pages are to extend the information entered on the Family Group Record Sheets which should be opened at the Page specified below.

We will start with Page No.1 which concerns Peter Burningham who according to Froyle Historian Mr.Thomas Knight was the first of our family to settle in the Froyle area of Hampshire. You will notice two alternative spellings of his basic name, one spelt like the town of Birmingham the other spelt Bermingham, the ancient and Irish way but in common with most of the Irish family that came to England he spelt his name Burningham as ours is today. This has always so recorded in England ever since the time of King Edward I when a Sir Peter or Piers de Bermingham came over in 1283 from Ireland and his name was entered as Burningham and this fact may be used as proof that our family branch came specifically from Ireland.

Froyle history states that this Peter, entered on Page 1. was the fourth son of a Baron of Athenry in Co.Galway Ireland and that he came over here about 1580/81 with his son Barnard and his grandson Peter who was a baby-in-arms at the time. The only Baron of Athenry that this could apply to was Sir Richard Bermingham the 9th. Baron who took his title in 1547 and died in 1580. Indeed he is the sole candidate who could have filled the bill as all other branches of the Athenry Barony had become extinct with the death of Meyler the 7th. Baron in 1529. This Sir Richard was from a collateral branch the living in the Carbury area of Co.Kildare, a district then known as "Bermingham's Country" since the 14th. century and descended from the Sir Peter de Bermingham mentioned above in 1283. Sir Richard's eldest son Edmond Bermingham became 10th. Baron in 1580 and Peter the youngest son came over here and settled at Cattley's Farm in Froyle where Froyle House stands today. Cattley's Farm was owned in 1584 by the Danette family who were intermarried with the Berminghams of Birmingham manor in Warwickshire.

We now refer to the first wife of Peter Burningham whose name is listed as Clarke which has been deduced from documents in Reading Archives but later research has shown that he may have married secondly a widow name Danette, of the family that owned Cattley's farm. Now we come to the children of Peter by his first wife probably name Avis or Hawise Clarke starting with Edward who married Alice Reynolds and was Mayor of Reading in 1601...Hugh was a tailor of Winkfield, Berks and the 3rd child Barnard was our ancestor, but more about him later. Information then give us Avis and Thomas as the youngest children, who are mentioned in family wills.

Next we come to Barnard Burningham of Stean Farm, Binsted in Hampshire probably born at Athenry and married about 1580 and died before 1620 at Binsted. He married a Jane whose name was probably Founter or Pender, the latter being an English variation of the Irish Bendergast, a local Galway tribe into which we intermarried in Ireland. Barnard only had one surviving child Peter who was born in Ireland as stated above in 1580 to 1581. Barnard's details are entered on Page No.2.

Continuing with Barnard Burningham on Page No.2....He seems to have had plenty of money, he had servants to wait on him complete with butler, he was granted the manor of Neatham, Hampshire in 1614 by his kinsman Sir Anthony Browne, Viscount Montague for £170.15s. Barnard was illiterate his surname being spelt three ways in his will and he signed himself with a mark displayed on the left-hand side of the insert on Page 2. which could have been derived from the millrind in the Froyle Heraldry shown on the right. Both he and his son Peter obtained mortgages from yet another distant relative, Henry Fitzwilliams a relative of Viscount Montague. The Farnham descendants seem to imply that these ancient Burninghams got their money from horse-trading but there is no evidence at this time to support this statement, indeed Barnard only had one mare worth £2. at his death in 1620...but the horse-trading was to come later, as we shall see. His will mentions one interesting item however a rent of £5. owing to him for a hall at Everslee...probably now spelt Evely near Blackmoor, Hampshire.

Now please turn to Page No.3. which relates to Peter Burningham of Malms Farm, Binsted, which contained several quarries of Malmstone which was used for high quality brick making...a valuable asset. Peter was born in Ireland in 1580/81 possibly at Carbury or Athenry and he is the one who came to England as a baby-in-arms. He married Elizabeth May about 1604 and the marriage brought him considerable wealth as she was of good family, the niece of Sir Humphrey May, master of the Rolls in Chancery Lane in London who lived at Brocas Farm at Froyle. It is possible that Peter and Elizabeth were actually married in the Rolls Chapel in Chancery Lane but the records are lost due to the Great Fire of London in 1666. It also appears that Peter moved into Cattley's Farm upon the death of his grand-father in 1608 for we know from records that he was living there in 1612, moving later into Malms Farm which adjoined his father's Stean Farm at Binsted on his death in 1620 Peter Burningham running both farms as a joint venture until his own untimely death in 1623 when he died possibly of T.B. but Froyle history tells of a fall from a horse, possibly true...he had a small brewery installed in his house. He died a wealthy man for those days leaving a very successful farmstead in trust to Peter his eldest son for he was under 21, but he left our ancestor Barnard only five shillings in his will...but after all he was only 8 years old (for reference it was worth 25 pence in modern money). Cattley's Farm was not mentioned in either Barnard's or Peter's wills as it was then being rented at the time. The Burninghams bought the Farm later and it became an integral part of their estate, Froyle House later being built on the site by Thomas Burningham, Esquire.

We must now turn to Page No.4. on which is entered the details of Barnard Burningham our ancestor who inherited the 5 shillings mentioned previously and was still without money or property when he married in 1637...how he fared until then is not recorded but I suspect that Barnard, like all younger sons of yeoman farmers, worked on the family estates as a labourer just for his keep without payment.

Continuing with Bernard Burningham on Page No.4....He was born about 1612 probably at Cattley's Farm in Froyle and he married on 2nd June 1637, Ann Wheeler the eldest daughter of Henry Wheeler at St.Maurice's Church here in Winchester. Henry Wheeler was very generous with his marriage settlements for he was a very wealthy man owner of various properties including a fulling mill known as 'La Mulle' now Millcourt on the river Wey in Binsted and purchased in 1624 which became the Wheeler's family home. Henry Wheeler had one failing however for he was an inveterate gambler and some of his methods were very ruthless when property was involved.

Bernard and Ann Burningham had only 5 recorded children, the eldest named Henry after his maternal grandfather, was born at Binsted 1638 to 1640 but his birth is unrecorded. The first definite birth entry was Thomas who was born in 1656 about 17 years or so after Henry a date which incidentally coincided with the purchase of "Husseys" Farm by his father Bernard...twins were then born, the survivor then marrying Andrew Baldwin and lastly Bernard who married Susan Draper the daughter of Froyle's Lord of the manor. Things were beginning to look up in the Burningham family for as stated above in 1656 Bernard Burningham suddenly appeared to have enough ready money in hand to purchase the sub-manor of "Husseys" and it's farm-lands for a down payment of £2,100 and a firm guarantee of two further yearly payments of £214 and that was a lot of money in those days!!!

Bernard Burningham bought the property from Col. John Fiennes of Cromwell's Army and his younger brother Richard Fiennes, the younger sons of Viscount Saye and Sele, Commander of Cromwell's Blue Regiment, who was quote' to have a hand in all the evils of the time' There is a strong possibility that Bernard had trouble in paying the last two final instalments which may account for him not buying the manorial rights with "Husseys" therefore insuring that it became a sub-manor of Froyle to which future Burninghams would have to pay suit.

Included in the sale of "Husseys" was part of Brocas Farm which since the 14th. century had been famous for it's horses, including chargers and the so-called 'great horses' which had always been much in demand by high-ranking field officers right up to Cromwellian times to carry them when clad in armour, for they would pay as much as £5,000 in modern money for them...I suggest that Bernard Burningham was in the Fiennes regiment, borrowed the money from them to rent the farm from owner Jephson to breed the horses, Col. John Fiennes then acted as agent to sell the horses to fellow officers or Army Ordnance at inflated prices. The Fiennes brothers then bought the farms in 1652, after the wastage of horses in the Irish Campaign, complete with it's stock of horses which they then sold off then later in 1656 went through an exercise selling "Husseys" with part of Brocas to Bernard Burningham, to whom they owed money for the horses, with very little money changing hands. So maybe the statement that the Burninghams were originally horse traders had a foundation in fact and not just a family legend.

The family history on Page No.5. deals with Henry Burningham, known as Senior in Froyle records...as stated previously he has no recorded birthdate or birthplace but I have assumed it was 1638 at Binsted. I suggest that he was brought up at Binsted by his mother at her family home of Millcourt during his father's absence on military service with the Cromwellian Army. This I think gave him a taste of living like the local gentry which was to affect him all his life. He was about 17 years of age when his father Bernard bought "Husseys" and I think that he took to the good life as a duck takes to water.

As I stated previously his father may have had difficulty raising the last two payments of £214 on purchasing "Husseys" and I think that they were paid by one of the tenants, namely William Newman of Brocas Farm, the final payment coinciding with Henry Burningham's 21st birthday in 1659 for Bernard Burningham had sold the said Brocas Farm to William Newman in that year for £710 possibly as part of a marriage agreement for Henry Burningham married Ann Newman a few years later when he took over "Husseys" from his father...I can find no trace of any marriage deeds but some Newman wills mentioned money to be paid back to their "kinsman" Henry Burningham, but the reason was not stated. "Husseys" which had reverted to growing hops after the horse episode seems for a while to have been run by both the Newman and Burningham families, for both families were concerned with the sub-letting to Thomas Blanchard, but from the time of the marriage of Henry and Ann Newman only the Burninghams controlled "Husseys".

Henry Burningham, Senior, was well in control in 1678 when an incident mentioned later occurred...Historically this particular Henry was the last owner of the Froyle estates in our line of descent...We will now discuss the children of Henry, the effect that they and their marriages had on our subsequent history. We start with Henry Burningham the eldest, later known as the Elder to distinguish him from his father who was known as Senior, as stated above. Henry married Ann Baldwin daughter of Thomas Baldwin, a tenant farmer of "Husseys". His brother Bernard married Sarah Baldwin, sister of Ann Baldwin in 1704 thus uniting Baldwin Farm with "Husseys" and which became an integral part of the estate from then on. As previously mentioned with this generation the main Froyle family and ours diverge Henry Burningham and his descendants inheriting the Froyle estates until 1915 when they went into Chancery. Whereas we are all descended from Henry Senior's fourth and youngest son John Burningham who married Elizabeth Harding of Farnham, Surrey

We now come to this most interesting character, entered on Page No.6. as John Burningham, yeoman and known to the Mormans as "The Churchwarden"...He was born at "Husseys" in 1683 and christened at Froyle Church, he married on the 8th October 1707, but there is a slight confliction of dates here with the Mormans, however the answer is that John took out a special licence on 24th September 1707 and married a fortnight later, Elizabeth Harding of Farnham, and this marriage was to cause a lot of trouble within the family.

Continuing with John Burningham on Page No.6....The marriage caused trouble because I think that his father Henry, Senior had probably got him lined up with a suitable marriage similar to his brothers either to extend or consolidate the "Husseys" estate as by the time that John was of age at 21 his father had already taken over the Baldwin's family farm by means of his other two son's marriages. The Froyle Burningshams were fast developing into the status of the "Landed Gentry" and Henry acted accordingly, for in 1678 he refused to attend the Court Leet of Froyle Manor and pay his dues of 3 shillings and 6 pence (17½ pence) He sent a message back to William Horner the Steward written in a bombastic manner saying that he refused to admit to the overlordship of Samuel Gauden, Lord of the Manor of Froyle. For Henry Burningham considered "Husseys" a manor in it's own right but he was wrong as his father Bernard had not bought the manorial rights in 1656.

Henry Burningham was tried by the Earl of Danby in the Court of Common Pleas... found guilty and ordered to pay-up with damages. Henry immediately climbed down and started grovelling claiming that he intended to pay but could not attend the Court owing to ill-health...he was very sorry for the trouble caused and it would not happen again. I quote this incident to demonstrate the "character" of Henry, John's father who was apparently a bully as well as a coward. One can imagine his reaction when John told him that he had got a girl of the 'labouring classes' into trouble and was planning to marry her by special licence...no doubt anticipating resistance by Henry...either locally or over the County border in Farnham where the girl lived. Without Henry blustered and threatened John that he would kick him out of "Husseys" if the wedding took place...even if the girl was four months pregnant John should ignore it, said Henry. John reacted in a typical manner of the Burningshams to the bullying by becoming even more resolved to marry, the fortnight between the issue of the licence and the wedding on 8th October 1707 must have been fraught with arguments between father and son but finally John left Froyle for good, married Elizabeth and settled in the Alton Area, probably at the farm of his brother Bernard at Kingsley. John's first son was born in January 1708 and baptised at Alton in March...one more child was to be born there before the couple moved to Upton Grey where John acted as Farm Manager or Bailiff to John Limbery of Hoddington Manor for the following 15 years or so. Our ancestor Jacob and Bryan, ancestor of the Mormans being born there. The Burningshams lived at the Village Farm House in a corner of Hoddington Park until 1725 when it was taken over by a poet named Henry Fielding...and John with his wife and family moved to a farmstead at a corner of Dogmersfield Park near Odiham which was rented from Ellis St. John the owner. Their last child Jonathan was born there in February 1726 and he was to live the major part of his life there because of a sequence of events in December 1728 which was to effect all their lives for many years to come.

As stated previously Elizabeth Harding was of labouring class, for her father John or Jack Harding was a ~~brick-layer~~ of a mason of some sort who was working on the rebuilding of Dogmersfield House for Ellis St. John.

Continuing with John Burningham on Page No.6...His father-in-law John Harding John Harding, a bricklayer was employed by Ellis St. John refacing Dogmersfield House in red brick in the style of Queen Anne. Ellis St. John ran out of money, his wife's of course, in 1727 or 28 and to complete the House he offered on lease various farms and arable land as an inducement to the workmen to complete the work. Among these was John Harding whose daughter was renting Park Corner Farm from the same Ellis St. John. As John Harding realised that he did not stand a chance of payment he arranged for his daughter Elizabeth to take over the farm and farmlands, by means of an agreement in December 1728, on lease for 99 years with a clause for future revision.

The farmstead then consisted the farmhouse with a cluster of five or six adjacent cottages, one of which was converted into a wheelwright's shop and another into a forge. Everyone got their water from a well of sweet water at the rear of the main farmhouse which is still in use today. The farmhouse was built in the Tudor period and the exterior is well worth seeing and even today it retains it's ancient floor plan although modified. In 1728 the holding was worked by a small community living in the vicinity of the main farmhouse and a few scattered cottages. The area in which the farm was situated was known as Horsedean of Horsden which was a valley of flattish farmland in the lee of a steep hill known as Horsedown which rises to a height of 541 feet above sea level. This Hill had a ring a dense woodland which ran down to the rear of the farm which was situated on the edge of it...The farmland was about 400 feet above sea-level and extended in front of the farmstead for many acres. It was a very healthy location judging by the longevity of the Burningshams living there at the time.

One fact that slightly hampered research however was that the Parish boundaries of Odiham and Crondall ran across the farmstead...the farmhouse being in Odiham & the cottages in Crondall but in reality just across the farmyard. John and Elizabeth were documented at Odiham while Benjamin & Jonathan were entered at Crondall It is possible that at the death of Elizabeth that Benjamin was living at Kingsley under the terms of his uncle Bernard's will of 1731.

However at this point both the Farnham & Morman families diverge, the former being descended from Jacob 2nd. son of John & Elizabeth and the latter being descended from Bryan their fifth son, whose further history is covered by the Library at Salt Lake City in Utah, U.S.A.

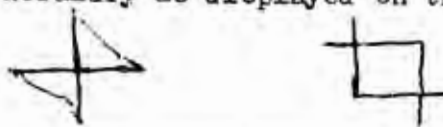

Barnard Burningham's family first settled briefly near Reading in Berkshire before he was granted mortgages by his relatives the Fitz-Williams and Brownes also from Ireland... Dublin and Athenry, whose English relatives became Earl of Southampton and Viscount Montague owning property and lands in the Proyle area.

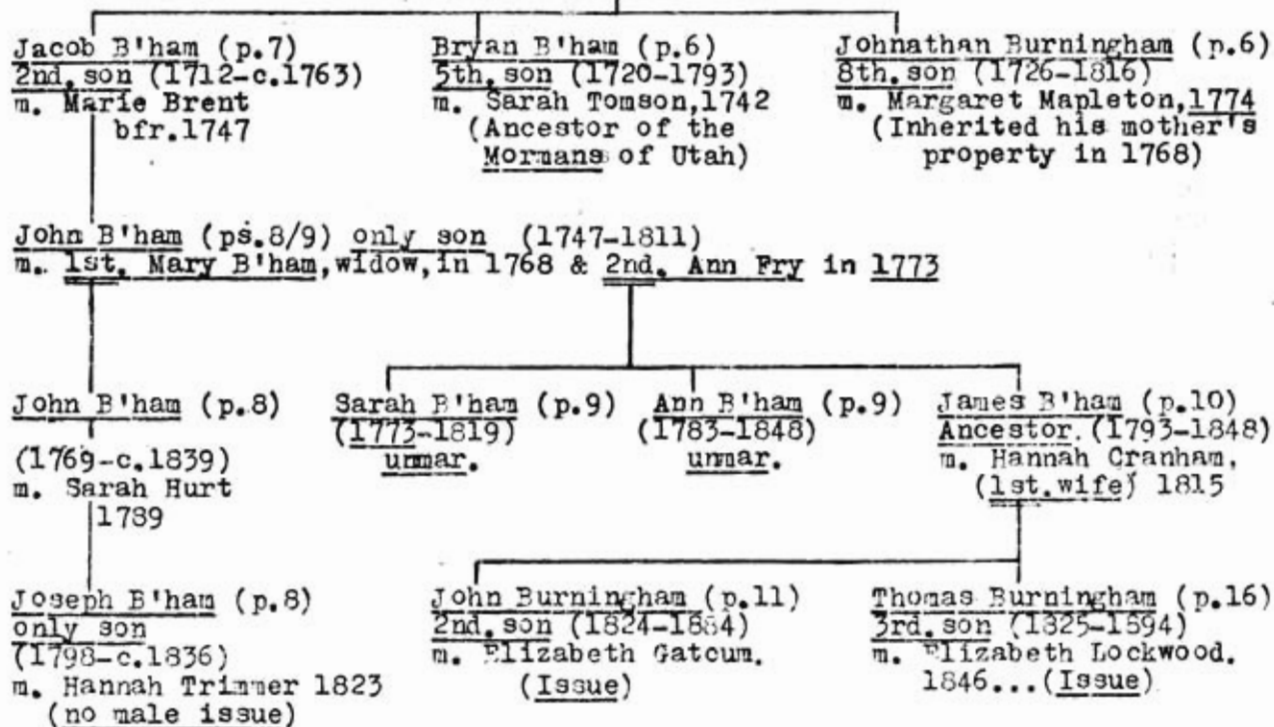

These pages are to bring the History on the preceding pages up to comparatively modern times and concerns mainly the origins and descent of the Farnham based branch of the Burningham family which includes the editor of these records.

Firstly we must establish one fact that in days gone by it was not thought necessary for couples to get married until the girl became pregnant among the labouring classes and judging from Parish records of the day...not always then, the baby in most cases taking the father's name anyway. Marriage was a definite necessity when property, status or money was concerned & of course, mostly affected the landed gentry & upper classes for inheritance purposes. Only a very small part of our family fell into this class & of course only these are documented. In consequence several of the marriages were very tight upon the birth of their first-born, and I suspect that marriage in those cases was because of Church pressure or 'respectability'

Now we must have a recap. on the previous Page No.6. which concerns John Burningham Yeoman and "The Churchwarden" of Upton Grey in 1718. He had ten children, the first two being born probably at Kingsley and baptised at Alton, then the next seven were born at Upton Grey. It is interesting to note that the first four baptised up to 1718 were baptised as BORNEGEM, then after John became Churchwarden the remaining three were baptised as BURNINGHAM. Their last child Jonathan was baptised at Odiham as the latter. All the children except Jonathan were illiterate and the family, when they grew up were called BURNEGEM & indeed Bryan, the ancestor of the Mormans, was married in that name and his mother Elizabeth was buried as BURNEGEM at Odiham. This will show the difficulty in researching this history for as our branch descended the social ladder and became labourers, the name took on peculiar forms.

We now come to the direct ancestors of the Farnham branch starting with Jacob Burningham on Page No.7. He was baptised at Upton Grey on September 3 1712 as BORN-EGEM, his family living at the Farm House in Hoddington Park where his father John was Bailiff to John Limbery, Lord of the manor. From then on the history of Jacob is obscure for the next time that he is mentioned is in his Uncle Bernard of Kingsley's will of 1731 in which he was left 10 pounds, his other nine brothers and sisters receiving only 5 pounds apiece. This fact is strange for Bernard finally left all his property and lands to Jacob's youngest brothers Benjamin and Jonathan who were only 7 and 5 at the time of the will whilst Jacob was 19 years old. The next entry at Alton records..Baptised, John son of Jacob and Martha Burningham 16 Oct. 1747, but as no record of their marriage can be found in any of the surrounding parishes we must assume that Martha was a common-law wife and that John was illegitimate but could retain the name Burningham because Jacob admitted paternity. We must face the fact that if Martha was of the same age as Jacob...about 35, then John may have been born slightly simple.

It is possible that Jacob may have been living at Kingsley from 1726 until his death in or about 1761 but we have no record of his death.

The Mormans have an undated record of a marriage between a Jacob Burningham and Marie or Mary Brent but I cannot trace it, if so Martha may have been a misspelling of Marie, for some Church records were kept in a very slack manner. We have an entry at Alton of a Mary Burningham buried 7 November 1750 but it may have been anywhere in the deanery for the parish boundaries of Alton, Kingsley & Binsted met just outside Kingsley. If that burial entry was that of Jacob's wife then he was a widower when his son John was only 3 years old, and John legitimate.

We know that Jacob Burningham was alive in 1760, from an entry in his father's will, but was dead in 1762 from his mother's will...so we assume that he died about the age of 50 leaving a son John Burningham, our ancestor, who was about 14 at the time. He was an orphan as far as I can assess and we deal with him next.

We now refer to Pages 8 and 9, which deal primarily with the two marriages of John Burningham, our most controversial ancestor for very little was known of his early life before he came to Farnham in 1785. As stated previously we have his date of baptism at Alton in 1747 which gives no hint of irregularity. I think that like his father Jacob, he was illiterate and also like his father he was not apprenticed to any trade at 14 and was destined to be a farm labourer. However his grandparents seem to have regarded John with great affection and I think that on the death of his father Jacob in 1761 he went to their farm at Park Corner and was employed as a servant within the house. Both John & Elizabeth Burningham left him bequests in their respective wills, his grandfather, John, leaving him £50 and his grandmother Elizabeth Burningham, formerly Harding, £72 in trust for when he reached 21 years of age in 1768. These bequests made him a very marriageable prospect in those days for as shown on Page No.8. immediately after his 21st birthday he married Mary Burningham, widow of his eldest cousin Thomas Burningham and she was heavily pregnant at the time...indeed her son John was born probably in the same month, a very close thing disputed by the Mormans who say that John was born before the wedding. There is no doubt in my mind that John was the father and therefore the baby was his eldest son...but he was not an ancestor of ours who was James, his son by his second marriage entered on Page No.9. of the family record sheets.

Mary Burningham died in February 1771 leaving John with a step-daughter aged 11 and a baby son aged 2 years...a heavy responsibility for a young man of 24 who was a servant in another person's house for by now both his grandparents were dead and the Farm was being run by his uncles, probably Bryan with his family of 6 children with their families, Benjamin with his wife Sarah and family and finally Jonathan then unmarried who actually ran both the estates at Park Corner Farm and Kingsley. John was not unmarried for long however for in April 1773 he married Ann Fry at Farnham in her later stages of pregnancy for she had her first child 3 months later in July 1773. However I think that things became fraught when Jonathan married in 1774 and had a baby daughter, Ann, in 1776 & accommodation became very cramped.

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My reason for assuming that Park Corner Farm was becoming overcrowded, in that same year 1776 John and Ann Burningham, had another child named Benjamin and I think that they left the Farm and John became an itinerant farm labourer and his wife Ann a servant. Nine years were to pass before we next hear of John Birmingham as he was now known, when he and his wife Ann, formerly Fry, christened a baby girl named Ann Birmingham aged about 2, at Farnham parish church on 14 October 1785. One explanation for the delay given by one of the Farnham family is that John may have been serving a prison sentence of about 3 years for some crime and obtained some remission. We have no idea where John and his family were during the missing years maybe he gravitated back to the Kingsley area and committed some crime in Hampshire which upset the Froyle Burningshams, but he remained as far as we can trace in Farnham until his death working at Coxbridge Farm for the Andrews, while I think that Ann his wife worked at some time for the Kerrs, Marquis of Lothian.

There has always been an air of mystery and perhaps scandal about our ancestor John Birmingham alias Burningham in Farnham and we must remember that he married a local girl in Farnham and returning with her in 1785 under rather dubious circumstances...and so rumours spread. It may have been quite harmless but as I have said John may have been a bit simple and easily lead. We do know however that both John and his wife were illiterate and when he died in 1811 Ann Burningham rented a cottage in Alton Road, Coxbridge, Farnham from the family of Lord Lothian for whom as stated she probably worked as a servant. This cottage was to be the family home for the next 80 years or so.

I must now refer you to Page No.10. which deals with James Burningham who was baptised as James Birmingham at Farnham Parish church in February 1793. He was the only son by Ann Fry, the second wife John Burningham, and our direct ancestor. James changed his name to Burningham when he married Hannah Cranham, his first wife, in 1815 and we are all descended from this marriage. She died in 1840 leaving James with 6 surviving children...the eldest William, being about 18 years old and apprenticed to a tailor in London. The next son John, was about 16 years old and apprenticed to a baker in Downing St, Farnham, the next was Thomas who was 15 and also in apprenticeship to Mr. Elliott a blacksmith near his home and the last son was Henry who was still at school, there were also two daughters still at home. Due to the shortage of money I think that the apprenticeships of James's sons were paid for by their maternal grandfather Thomas Cranham, a wealthy hop-grower of Farnham who lived opposite them in the Chautries.

In the Census of 1841 James Burningham was entered as an agricultural labourer but in the next year 1842, he was employed as a foreman labourer at 14 shillings a week by Surveyor Trimmer, the father-in-law of his nephew Joseph Burningham. He was employed on the construction of a portion of the new London to Gosport road until its completion in 1846 when James & the other labourers were discharged.

We will now deal with the four surviving sons of James Burningham and his wife Hannah, formerly Cranham in more detail. We start with the eldest son William who was apprenticed in London to a tailor. He never returned to Farnham to live but was living in the Tottenham area when last heard of. He had 2 sons & 3 daughters but little is known of this family except that I think that at least one son was also a tailor...William died in 1906 aged 84. The next son was John who was locally apprenticed to a baker in Downing St. Farnham and eventually, because of the high quality of his wares, had baker's shops in the Borough and Castle St. Farnham. He was married to Elizabeth Gatum of Farnham and was the ancestor of most of the Burningshams living there today...Arthur Winkworth Burningham, the former family historian was their grandson. The third son, Thomas is dealt with in more detail later and their youngest son Henry, who was apprenticed to his brother John as a baker, married Ann Wareham of Odiham and emigrated to St. Anthony Idaho and later moved to St. Paul, Minnesota where his descendants live today. I am still in touch with them today in 1979 but the family has nearly died out in the male line, throughout U. S. A.

James Burningham, like his father John, was married twice and his second wife, Mary Lockwood, formerly Robinson, was the widow of Sgt. Major Joseph Lockwood who is buried in the cemetery of the Royal Military Academy which he helped to found in 1821 at Camberley. James Burningham and Mary Lockwood married in 1843 and James then had 2 step-daughters to look after in addition to his own family which included Thomas, a lusty young man of 18 apprenticed to Elliotts the Blacksmiths nearby. The eldest step-daughter was 22 and named Elizabeth and we will deal with her later, and the youngest was Ann who was 20 and both were unmarried. They all moved into the small cottage in Alton Road and accomodation must have been very cramped.

Research shows that around the time of his second marriage James was going thru a crisis, for he had just been demoted from his job as Foreman labourer, his Bronchitis was developing into T.B. and the strain of was happened next certainly did not improve his health. For in the next year in December 1844, Elizabeth Lockwood gave birth in Farnham Workhouse, to an illegitimate son Frederick Lockwood and obviously Thomas Burningham, now aged 19 was the father but unable to marry as he still had 2 years to run of his apprenticeship. However matters came to a head in 1846 when Elizabeth again became pregnant and it was obvious that the baby was going to be born before Thomas's 21st birthday in September when he would finish his time with Elliotts, go on full pay and be able to support a family. To make matters worse James' job with Surveyor Trimmer had finished in June 1846 and he was unemployed with only the money from his wife, Mary coming in from her laundering. Anyway Thomas and Elizabeth were married in the Spring of 1846 and the baby named Joseph James Burningham was born in August 1846. Recent research shows however that the marriage was not legal for the following reason. In law the daughter of a wife cannot marry the son of her husband, thus Elizabeth Lockwood, daughter of widow Mary Lockwood could not legally marry Thomas the son of James Burningham her 2nd husband.

This means that all the children of Thomas Burningham and Elizabeth Lockwood were illegitimate but those born after the "marriage" could legally claim the name of Burningham because on their birth certificates Thomas had admitted paternity, but in the case of their first-born Frederick Lockwood no father's name was entered on his birth certificate, but he adopted the name anyway. In the case of Joseph Burningham he was really as illegitimate as Frederick but he and his brothers were entitled to use the family name, thus maintaining by name a direct link with their Saxon ancestors of way before the Norman Conquest.

By a twist of fate Joseph Burningham married Ellen Taylor who also was illegitimate, but of course all their children were legally born in wedlock.

Now to return to James Burningham in still more detail... He was said to have been a reserved man of good appearance, well educated, wrote well and played the piccolo and clarinet as well as being a church bell-ringer. He made a creditable violin that was well-made and played well. The editor's comment upon these worthy attributes is that it is a pity that he did not put them to better use instead of being employed all his life as a labourer but as we have seen he may have been slightly of an irresponsible nature and easy going in character. Little was said to have been known in Farnham of his origins, which is strange as he was born there in 1793. There was a rumour that both James and his mother returned to Farnham about the time of his father's burial in 1811 but I have no proof of this or where they came from. But one thing is recorded, about this time Ann Burningham rented a cottage in Alton Road from the Kerr family, which was to become the future home of the family for the next 80 years or so. James was very mischievous when he told his sons that he was very closely related to the Froyle Burninghams and should have inherited their estates in Hampshire. This statement as we know was absolutely untrue, because he was at least 3 generations away from them and it was during this time that by careful marriage into wealthy families and using their wife's money that they had built up the estate.

Never at any time did the Farnham Burninghams have any rights to "Husseys" as that property descended quite legally to the Froyle Burninghams without any legal break in continuity. As far as Froyle House is concerned, it is built of the site of Catley's Farm which did not come into the ownership of the Burninghams until at least 1737 although they had lived there without a break since 1584. The main part of the property was not bought until between 1770 and 1780. As John Burningham left Froyle in 1707 it is obvious that most of the estate was obtained after that date, but in any case John was the fourth son of Henry Burningham of "Husseys" whose eldest son Henry inherited "Husseys" quite legally as first-born.

The main stumbling block to James Burningham being heir to the Froyle estates was the question of the legitimacy of his father John Burningham.

The fact that John Burningham may have been illegitimate was suggested by Arthur Winkworth Burningham... He unfortunately selected the wrong branch to research and try to resolve the doubt, for there must have been a rumour within the family about John's parentage for him to try and follow it up, but I think that his main motive was personal and was an endeavour to prove to everyone that he was descended from the Peerage and nobility, he never mentioned that he had labourers preceding him.

It is interesting to note that at the time of his investigations there was another Burningham family in Farnham who actually could claim an unbroken legal descent direct from the Froyle Burninghams. They were descended from Thomas Burningham a cabinet-maker of High Park Corner, Farnham whose son Edwin had kept the Nelson's Arms pub in Castle Street during the Crimean War and whose descendants are still living in Farnham today... Yet despite their history they also had no claim on the Froyle estates, but to be fair they never made any such claim to my knowledge. The other branch of this family went to Weybridge and Walton-on-Thames where they set up a number of businesses on the catering side.

To summarize... Regarding the gaps in John Burningham's history, they remain unexplained and allow speculation, but I think that he and his wife Ann did not get on very well of indeed live together for years at a time. It appears that after the birth of James she left Farnham for some reason only returning at the death of her husband in 1811 bringing James back with her aged 18 years of age, her daughter Ann was at this time a housekeeper at Farnborough and aged 28... maybe her mother was with her also in service.

Regarding James Burningham, he may have been schooled but he was never apprenticed and was just a casual labourer all his life. His education was not enough for him to pursue a career as a clerk which would have suited him much better in view of his apparent poor state of health. James died of bronchitis and T.B. in March 1848 aged 55 and was buried opposite the south-west buttress with, we are informed, both his wives and his mother.

This history was researched and presented by James Burningham's gt-gt-grandson, Walter Philip Burningham, of Winchester, Hampshire, England in May 1979.

Schedule of kindred & affinity showing that the marriage of Thomas Burningham and his step-sister Elizabeth Lockwood was not legal.

Underlined is the relevant statement applying to the marriage.

Elizabeth Lockwood was the daughter of Mary Lockwood, widow and Thomas was the son of James Burningham, widower. The parents married on 6 April 1843 at Farnham Parish Church. Their children married in the Spring of 1846 but there can be no doubt that their marriage was illegal according to the document displayed below. I have also no reason to suppose that they were aware of this fact for they married to make the birth of my ancestor Joseph Burningham legal in their opinion.

Although the children of the marriage were technically illegitimate, the fact that Thomas admitted paternity gave the children the right to the legal use of the name Burningham. However they were precluded from any inheritance concerning their ancient family from Froyle and Ireland.
